# A treasure trove of warm, everyday experiences

T L'ABRI'S first volunteer training session in 1991, founder Eleanor Beattie referred to ordinary people doing extraordinary things. Twenty-five years later, we're a vibrant—indeed extraordinary—organization, but very much focused on the ordinary, on everyday life and experiences.

L'Abri grew out of the conviction that social isolation was a major problem for people with serious mental illness, and that inclusion was at the heart of recovery. So, over the years, L'Abri people have aspired to create the ordinary: a roof over the head, food on the table and a sense of belonging to a community of friends.

We can all relate to the cherished memories of L'Abri's first 25 years. A favourite for many is of campfires on the beach at Camp Kinkora. For years, a resident named **Tony** was in charge of building and tending the fires, and board member **Sharyn Scott** 

would rally everyone to join the circle to chat, sing and tell stories.

For years, Hallowe'en parties were held at the Bahama apartment in NDG. Bahama resident **Beverley Hartley** recalls one such party where she dyed the tub water red, floated plastic eyeballs in the water, and dangled a lone arm over the side of the tub. All night long, the party was punctuated with yelps as people entered the bathroom.

Relationships can be a minefield for people with mental illness,

so establishing a community in which relationships can grow has been a key value for L'Abri. Benny resident **Rick Ottoni**

# Our evolving real estate search

UR RENTED OFFICE in the Queen Elizabeth Health Complex is a pleasant but limited space. Our executive director and two coordinators share it with an administrative assistant and a student doing a social work placement.

We have let go of the small office we rented next door to accommodate Applied Dissemination, a program to support groups working to start residential programs based on our model. When that wound down last year, we rearranged the main office to house the archives and filing cabinets previously in the small room. But now it has become apparent to the board that we need more space.

A couple of years ago we began to discuss the possibility of buying a property. After almost a quarter century of operation, wonderful support from the community, and excellent stewardship, L'Abri was in a position to permanently fix its place in the community and guarantee

those living with mental illness a resource for housing.

The original idea was a home for three residents—possibly combined with a floor for tenants—but this evolved into a plan for a building housing our office below and three residents above.

In November 2014, a real estate committee was formed, and guided by a

HAVE SO FAR MADE trusted agent, we began our search in Ville-Émard in south-west

Montreal. The challenge was to find an adequate building in a location convenient to residents and volunteers. Complicating our search were zoning restrictions making it difficult to find a property suitable for both residential and professional use.

By spring of 2015 we returned to the idea of simply housing three residents, possibly in a condo. We began looking in NDG, and made offers to purchase one and later another condo, both of which seemed ideal. But there was something

wrong with each: either structural problems found in inspection, or condo committee complications.

As purchase of a condo seemed imminent, we canvassed our residents and were surprised to learn all were reluctant to move, even to a nicer space. So after discussing the situation in detail we decided to look for an office space alone, big enough to allow for residents to get together for activities.

Recently we thought we had finally found our perfect office, ideally located in the heart of Westmount. However, after the conditions of sale became too complex to pursue, we decided to abandon our offer to purchase.

We have so far made 23 visits to properties. We will keep looking, optimistic we will find what we are searching for: a bigger and better space for our wonderful staff, with a place for the board to meet and for residents and committees to conduct meetings and activities.

# Always sunny and ready to help out

LOVELY SMILE, a ready laugh, and a willingness to pitch in. Such are the traits that make Cecily Lawson a much-loved volunteer. Since joining L'Abri eight years ago, Cecily has enriched us with her people skills and her talent in communications. Most recently she has found time in her busy life to steer our committee on individual fundraising.

A native Montrealer, Cecily worked for 16 years until 1997 at the Royal Victoria Hospital, where she was a public information officer and eventually director of communications. Years later, when working as a consultant, she was approached about volunteering at L'Abri by her friend Gael Eakin, now our copresident. She sat down with Gael and Nancy Grayson—who she'd known at the Royal Vic when Nancy was director of social work—and they "presented such an interesting picture of the organization that I said yes."

In 2008 Cecily joined the volunteer team at the Bahama apartment, housing three women. Over the years Cecily has graciously hosted potluck suppers and Scrabble nights at her downtown apartment, and joined

other volunteers for visits to Atwater Market and walks on the mountain with residents.

Before long, Cecily was helping write and edit our bi-annual newsletter, and pitching in to write personal thank-you notes to our donors. She was soon named to our board of directors. And about five years ago, she accepted a request by **Audrey Bean** to work on individual fundraising, including composing letters to donors.

"Of course, L'Abri needs financial support to carry out its mission", she says. "But we're lucky in that we have so many loyal supporters, people who are friends of our founders and board members and residents. They've known about us for years and have donated to us year in, year out. And we have new supporters too."

Finding the time for all this cannot have

place in the Eastern Townships. Four and a half years ago she married Bob Carswell, who she often accompanies on birdwatching trips. In spite of all this, Cecily stepped up in the past year to head individual fundraising, filling a huge gap left by the sudden death of Audrey Bean and withdrawal from active involvement by **Eleanor Beattie**. At the same time she joined our executive. We are so grateful for her involvement.

Things evolve in the course of 25 years. L'Abri has grown from one apartment to ten, and from a desk and phone in loaned space to a very busy office with a staff of four. # A volunteer at heart

**ESIDENTS** of the Bessborough apartment and many whose lives she touched at L'Abri en Ville were shocked and saddened at the passing of volunteer Judy Stevens on February 7 at the age of 76. Judy will be especially missed for her unique warmth and intensity in connecting with others. "She really listened", says former coordinator Marianne Metrakos, a close friend. "She was a very curious person who loved people." Best known for co-founding the community organization

Share the Warmth in 1989 to provide food and clothing to the needy, Judy learned about L'Abri from her NDG neighbour **Richard Tobin**, a volunteer at the Jolicoeur apartment. In spite of her demanding job, in the 90s she joined the volunteer team at the Madison apartment (later renamed

Bessborough). She remained involved until recently, a sterling example of patience and respect in her dealings with residents.

Judy joined our board—in part to gain knowledge, Marianne explains, "to inform her work at Share the Warmth". Over

the years she generously shared own her valuable knowledge, especially of fundraising.

At her 2013 induction into the Pointe-Saint-Charles Hall of Recognition, she said, "I'm a volunteer at heart. Community work is my soul."

Born in Brooklyn, New York, Judy moved to Montreal in 1959. She worked in cosmetics until her late forties, when she was struck by the plight of the homeless outside her office building and decided to tackle it head on. Hundreds of people



who benefited from her work turned out for her funeral, highlighted by a First Nations woman's chant to accompany Judy's soul on its journey.


