THE RECENT PURCHASE of our Montreal property at 2352 Duvernay St. last year was the culmination of a long and difficult search. Once settled in, we were eager to fling open our doors and celebrate.

Some of those present surely must have reflected what a long way we had come: from the small space we rented in 1991 at Catholic Community Services, to our sixth-floor rooms at the Queen Elizabeth Health Complex, and finally into our own spacious, new office and activity space in the old Stelco complex east of Atwater Market.

OUR NEW CO-PRESIDENT A CALM & CARING COUNSELLOR

IGHTEEN YEARS AGO, L'Abri en Ville's new co-president,
Eric Widdicombe, had just completed a Masters degree in Counselling
Psychology, when he was hired as a coordinator at L'Abri. The organization
was expanding and needed another staff person.

"Eric was terrific from the start," says Marianne Metrakos, his fellow coordinator. "He had a wonderful, calm way about him, was very accepting, never got ruffled. And all the female residents wanted him to be their coordinator."

It was a busy time for L'Abri. During his 18 months with us, Eric recalls helping with the opening of three new apartments—taking the organization from six to



nine three-bedroom units—as well as the move of two of the existing apartments. In addition to these responsibilities, Eric was training in group psychotherapy at the Montreal General Hospital.

In 2000, Eric left L'Abri to take a post in behaviour modification at the Douglas Hospital. "We were all really sorry to see him go,"

commented Marianne. Fortunately, he stayed in touch and in many ways remained part of L'Abri. Eric joined us many times for our late summer stay at Camp Kinkora,

bringing along his son, Noah, and filling his car with others who needed a lift. While at the Douglas, he also completed training in marriage and family therapy.

In 2006, Eric became a member of L'Abri's board of directors and chaired a committee on mental illness and aging. He stepped down from the board in 2009,

but was enticed back in 2015 and elected co-president in March of this year.

Eric's career took him from the Douglas to the McGill University Counselling Service to Pavillon Foster, where he did independent therapy with substance-dependent clients. He currently provides psychotherapy services to students at Concordia University.

Now 50, Eric considers L'Abri to be in a period of consolidation. He would like to attract more board members of his generation, and feels that it's important for L'Abri to reach out to younger volunteers. That idea was borne out in our recent presence at a mental health forum at Concordia.

We welcome Eric to his new position, and look forward to a fruitful collaboration.

Life amid debris

LAST JUNE, the owners of the duplex housing the Bessborough apartment, where I live, replaced our windows and front door. Then in January, five walls in four rooms were knocked down and replaced, adding thicker insulation. The aim was to modernize the building and make it more energy-efficient.

It was quite an experience to live through all that dust and noise! At the time, I was living alone in the apartment, which was probably a good thing. I was offered a chance to move out, but preferred to stay put and help see it through.

The work began in the fall of 2016, when the company that had installed the windows had to return to reposition them, in anticipation of the insulation work.

Before the walls came down in January, my bedroom was emptied and a lot of my things were put in storage in the basement. And so began two months of sleeping on the living room couch. During that time, I watched the landlord demolish and rebuild the five walls. Unfortunately, the work dragged on with frequent delays, as the rooms were completed one at a time.

To help out, I moved furniture around, covered it and cleaned up—over and over again. The idea was to protect everything from all the plaster dust. And there was a lot!

The most interesting part of the work was the transformation of a bedroom on the north-west corner of the duplex—the part that gets all the cold wind during winter. The coldest room in the apartment was converted into the warmest!

The bathroom wall was rebuilt and we have new tiles in our shower. Members of the Rotary Club of Westmount (pictured above) added the finishing touches by repainting all our new walls and some other rooms as well. Now I get to live in a beautiful, cozy apartment—and have a new roommate to share it with.

La boutique est vraiment belle.

Je travaille comme conseillère en ventes. Quand les clients entrent dans la boutique, je les salue et je leur demande s'ils voudraient

déguster un thé ou un café. J'explique au besoin la

mission de l'entreprise. Je les laisse regarder et faire le tout de la boutique, et je leur dis que s'ils ont des questions ou ont besoin de conseils pour un cadeau, je suis là pour les aider.

C'est un plaisir de travailler dans un endroit où l'ambiance et le climat de travail sont relaxants et conviviaux. Et contribuer à la mission d'entraide du commerce équitable est bien sûr valorisant.

ARTISTIC EXPRESSION LIGHTS UP L'ABRI'S NEW SPACE



Part remains open water with icy edges where the sun reflects. Landscape is one of my favourite subjects." Mary-Martha is a former volunteer and a good friend of L'Abri.



GAEL EAKIN | 'Bas St-Laurent' (2010), oil pastel | "This artwork was created at Notre-Dame-de-Portage beside the St. Lawrence River, and shows one of the Pilgrim Islands near Rivière-du-Loup. My great-great-grandfather took the train from Ottawa to his country home there in the 1800s, along with our first Prime Minister, Sir John A. Macdonald. I have a need to go back now and then, even if only for a few days." Gael is a volunteer and co-president of L'Abri's board of directors.





NANCY GRUNDY |'Abstract', oil | After living at L'Abri for many years, Nancy is doing well on her own. Trained in Fine Arts at Concordia University and the Atelier d'artisanat centreville, she is a talented weaver and painter, and contributed a sculpted head to the new L'Abri office. Like Renée (see above, right), Nancy lives at Benny Crescent and still keeps in touch with us.

CAROLYNE HARRISON | 'The Sybil', acrylic on canvas | "My approach for any abstract work is to layer many colours and shapes until the whole begins to talk to me." explains Carolyne. "What emerged here was a sylph-like, feminine figure. It seems entirely appropriate that L'Abri should have a presiding household goddess called Sybil on its third floor." Carolyne is a volunteer with the Park apartment.



RENÉE DROUIN | 'Colour Explosion', acrylic | Renée studied art at Dawson College and has attended art classes for 14 years at La rue des femmes. She says painting "makes me feel wonderful!" Renée is a former resident who now lives with her husband Sean—another former resident—in the Benny Crescent complex near many of our apartments, and likes to share her art with friends.



RICCARDO (RICK) **OTTONI** | 'Coloured Forms', watercolour Rick has lived at L'Abri since our early years in the 1990s. He is a self-taught artist who likes to "have fun" when he paints. Rick says, "I never know what will come out. It's a

tabula rasa. I just say a prayer to God to guide me". Asked if this painting is of flowers, he replies, "Who knows? Your mind has to fill in the blanks."
