New volunteers carefully matched with residents

HE PATH to volunteering at L'Abri in recent years has taken some turns. For a long time, most of our volunteers were recruited from Montreal's English-language faith communities. Now, congregations are ageing and some churches are even closing.

About a year ago, L'Abri decided to restructure its approach to recruiting new volunteers. A decision was made to create a "task-oriented" — and often time-limited — option which would pair new volunteers with one resident. We would continue to recruit long-term volunteers to apartment teams as before.

Coordinator **Lori Goodhand** took leadership for the job of recruitment, concentrating largely on universities — combing websites such as Concordia's and visiting resource

Volunteers paired with residents with similar interests fairs held on campuses. Lori has also been in touch with a church frequented by new arrivals. Our two placement students

and the two other coordinators have been working with Lori to interview interested candidates, and to help integrate them. So far they have integrated seven new volunteers, most opting to be paired with a resident, while one chose longer-term involvement with an apartment team.

In their interviews with task-oriented candidates, Lori and her team explain our approach and expectations, and seek to determine their interests and abilities. Then, with the interests of a particular resident in mind, they draw up an action plan. These volunteers meet regularly with their designated resident and, if they wish, can attend activities involving the apartment's volunteer team and all three residents.

One happy pairing came about when **George William Ssimbwa Bisirikirwa** — known as Bruce — came in for an interview. When staff considered his age and the fact that he hailed from Uganda, they immediately felt he might get along with **Gulam Sohrab**, one of our residents from the same country. Gulam works long hours doing maintenance work, and enjoys spending his free time with Bruce.

Annual general meeting 2023

'Abri staff, residents and volunteers met at the Unitarian Church on March 21, 2024, for their Annual General Meeting. President Pepita Capriolo welcomed members of the community to our first in-person Annual General Meeting in four years.

Highlights included...

- In January, members of the executive committee held the first of three meetings in 2023, to focus on volunteer attrition, rising rental costs and the strained healthcare system;
- This led to a Special Community Meeting held in May, where residents and volunteers were asked their views on these issues; and
- Their responses contributed to immediate action to upgrade apartments, and revive outreach to recruit new volunteers.

2023 financial report showed a healthy balance.

Jerome ~ A welcome Sunday visitor

VER SINCE L'Abri began back in 1991, volunteers and residents have visited faith communities around the city to talk about our project. But no other L'Abri resident has kept at it for as many years as **Jerome Kierans**, now in his sixties and a 25-year-plus veteran of these visits.

Usually driven by a volunteer, but occasionally on his own in a cab, Jerome travels with a photo display and pamphlets, and sometimes a bag of hasty notes designed by residents. With help or solo, he sets up in the church basement before attending the service. Congregants are invited to meet him at coffee hour.

Chatting over coffee and cookies, Jerome makes friends with a variety of people. "I tell them how wonderful

L'Abri is, and how it's been so good for me. Sometimes they tell me they have a relative with mental illness. They imagine how good L' Abri would be for them." In the early days, these visits were much more frequent. Volunteer-resident pairs would drive to churches in Westmount, NDG, Verdun, Lachine and Montreal West to describe how L'Abri is a safe and welcoming home for adults living with mental illness.

Over the last three decades, church attendance has dwindled. "We used to go to St George's, St Ignatius of Loyola, St Ansgar and other churches", Jerome notes. "Now it's

just Montreal West United, the Unitarian Church and St Andrew and St Paul." But faith communities are still an important means of spreading the word,

and Jerome remains a valued L'Abri ambassador. He enjoys these visits as much as his listeners do, and we're grateful for his important work. | SP

Il écrit sur les univers parallèles, l'espace-temps, et les collisions météorites. Puis, en écologie, il traite de la déforestation, des déplacements de population, de l'économie, de la sensibilité des animaux sauvages, de la pollution lumineuse, du retour du loup et de la migration des oiseaux.

Strengthening our capacity to meet housing needs

Over the past year, the L'Abri Times has reported on how the challenges of a volatile rental market, our aging population and our strained healthcare systems have uniquely impacted our community members.

We've also recognized that these issues are not isolated to our community, but problems many Canadians grapple with.

ur belief that solutions to these challenges — particularly housing precarity — will arise from collaborative community discourse led to my participation in a lively two-day event held in April, hosted by Centretown Affordable Housing Development Corporation (Cahdco) and the Centretown Citizens Ottawa Corporation (CCOC). Cahdco, an Ottawa-based non-profit real estate development corporation and sister organization to CCOC, offers a series of learning and networking opportunities which aim to increase affordable housing knowledge and organizational capacity for those hoping to meet housing needs in their communities.

In March, I enrolled in Cahdco's Blueprints Program,

a two-month online course where, alongside participants from across Canada, I studied typologies of affordable housing and feasibility studies, to build the essential knowledge base needed to embark on an affordable housing development project.

The in-person module of the program was hosted at the Beaver Barracks redevelopment site in downtown Ottawa, with approximately 30 participants in attendance. It was brilliantly coordinated: a balanced mix of engaging team exercises, informative panel presentations, site visits to local affordable housing developments, and peer networking.

On the first day, the in-person module opened with an ice-breaker challenge, then moved on to a case study exercise where each participant pitched a theoretical affordable housing development, and voted on the most feasible pitches. We then organized into six teams to work together over the next two days to develop those ideas into fully-realized affordable housing project proposals.

The second day featured presentations from the Canadian Mortgage and Housing Corporation, the Federation of Canadian Municipalities and the Community Housing Transformation Centre. Each presentation offered information about funding opportunities and support available for affordable housing developments, particularly those that meet the needs of their local communities and environmental sustainability goals. The event ended later that day with a tour of the housing on the CCOC's Beaver Barracks site, which boasts the largest residential geothermal system in Canada.

the largest residential geothermal system in Canada. I returned to Montreal with so much new information,

connections, peers, and optimism! As I write this, I am still a few weeks away from completing the program and already deeply inspired by the knowledge that we do not face the challenges of tomorrow alone.
