Anna, a resident for most of L'Abri's 34 years, has always had plenty on the go. Back in the 90s she successfully completed a Bachelor's degree from Concordia University, and has always kept busy attending free cultural events around town. In the past year or so, she assumed a big new responsibility: cleaning, cooking and caring for her ailing brother, who is unable to get CLSC help. After four days at his home north of Montreal she returns to her LaSalle apartment, ready to rejoin the fray. Dashing around town for concerts, movies and art shows is no problem for Anna, a regular user of public transit. "Today I'm going to the bank and the watch repair", she told me recently. "I need to get groceries, and this weekend there's an antiquarian book fair at Concordia." Does all this tire her out? "It keeps me hopping", she chirps. And, between times, Anna does tai chi and always has a book on hand.

Richard attends a social centre in the Plateau area four days a week. He regularly works on embroidery and mosaics there, and sings in the choir. On Fridays he does aquafitness at a pool near his home in NDG. And every week - since 1992! - he takes a lesson in soprano clarinet. As if that's not enough, for ten years Richard has been enrolled in evening courses at a college in Montreal North. He's studied psychology, history, geography and global economy, but his real passion is gerontology—especially working in the field, helping to keep seniors active. As he puts it, "Je l'aime à la folie". Richard also loves to cook and watch TV with his roommates. But, "just to keep things in balance", he tries to save time for solitude.

Canada brought frigid weather, a new job direction

A native of Hungary, Zsofia completed a

Masters degree in cultural anthropology
in Budapest. She emigrated to Canada in

November 2012 to join her partner, whom
she met doing field work in Boston. It was
quite a shock to arrive here at the beginning
of a true Canadian winter. "I felt like I had
come to the North Pole," said Zsofia, but she
loves Canada for its multicultural character
and its thriving arts and cultural life.

In the first years after her arrival, Zsofia took on a number of volunteer positions. She worked with Face à Face, a community organization that supports homeless people, helping them to obtain welfare payments and providing services such as a telephone hotline. She also volunteered with the Centre des Femmes de Montreal

and was a member of an improv theatre company, The Montreal Playback Theatre. She returned to school to do a Bachelor's degree in social work at McGill, graduating in 2021. She then joined the staff of the Jewish General Hospital working as a social worker, first in the hospital's Institute of Community and Family Psychiatry, and later in the Geriatric and Internal Medicine Clinic, where she remained until coming to L'Abri.

"I like to feel I am doing something useful," Zsofia said. "At L'Abri I like the fact that there is a community, a feeling of family; people are close."

Zsofia is working part-time and has started with four apartments: three in LaSalle and one in NDG. She and her partner are now married and have a seven-year-old daughter.

Fix-it man François: a good guy to know

RESIDENT **François Brodeur** has always enjoyed tinkering with things. When he was 11 years old a neighbour in Brossard, where he grew up, bought a used Nash Rambler (*similar to the one pictured here*) and François helped to dismantle and rebuild the car. At age 17, he began work as an electromechanical technician, installing, maintaining and repairing electric and electronic control systems used in a wide variety of equipment.



The work took him as far afield as Cuba where he was given the job of repairing the air conditioning system at Havana airport. Picked up at 4:30 AM to start his day, François

worked long hours and saw little of the popular holiday destination. He worked in this field until age 57, and retired about ten years ago.

For the past six years François has lived in one of our LaSalle apartments. Since joining us, he decided to give up smoking. Looking for ways to bolster his willpower, he zeroed in on the need to limit access to cigarettes. He then fashioned a lockbox which could hold a certain number of cigarettes, and be preset to open only at specific times for a short period. It can be programmed according to whatever schedule the user desires, but François believes that the optimum set up is to allow the box to open for one minute once an hour, from 8 AM to 9 PM. In the end he made two boxes and gave one to the kinesiologist who helped him to stop smoking, so she could share it with other clients.

François' interest in things mechanical extends beyond the lockbox. He has a small lab in his bedroom and repairs things for friends and neighbours. He recently took apart a neighbour's washing machine and put it back together again and, soon after, he was fixing a friend's television set. A good person to know!

Another community kitchen favourite

A POPULAR FEATURE of our Duvernay St. office is its kitchen. It's allowed residents to meet every few months to try out new recipes together, learn new skills and broaden their cooking repertoire. At one of last summer's "kitchens", eggs, veggies and feta cheese took centre stage in this recipe:

Mediterranean veggie quiche

PREP IN 20-30 MINUTES | COOK IN 50 MINUTES | MAKES 8 SERVINGS

INGREDIENTS

1 frozen, deep-dish pie crust

2 TBSP oil or butter

1 small onion, diced

1/2 TSP fine sea salt

3 cloves garlic, minced

1 medium tomato

1 small zucchini, diced

1 CUP chopped **mushrooms** or bell pepper

1 CUP chopped, packed **spinach** or kale

1 TSP oregano

Salt & pepper

6 large **eggs**

1/2 CUP milk

1/3 CUP crumbled **feta** cheese

1/2 CUP shredded **cheddar** cheese

DIRECTIONS

Prepare the frozen pie crust according to package directions. Preheat oven to $375\,^{\circ}\text{F}$.

Heat oil over medium heat in a large skillet. Add onion and a pinch of salt, and cook for 5 minutes. Add garlic, tomato, zucchini and mushrooms.

Cook another 10 minutes, or until veggies have softened. Add spinach, oregano, salt and pepper and cook 1–2 minutes, or until spinach wilts. Transfer veggies into the pie crust.

Whisk eggs, milk, feta and cheddar together in a medium bowl. Pour over veggies in uncooked pie crust. Top with an extra sprinkle of cheddar, if desired.

Bake 50–55 minutes, or until quiche has set. Allow quiche to cool for 15 minutes before slicing. *Bon appétit!*

Il est fasciné par son grand-père qui lui raconte une multitude d'histoires sur le village et les abeilles.

Est-ce que Omar retrouvera la force de vivre à Inzerki, la force de tout reconstruire malgré le soleil qui plombe? Le secret sera-t-il dévoilé à Anir?

Il faut absolument lire cet ouvrage puissant d'une beauté étonnante et d'une grande lucidité. « Souviens-toi des abeilles » un tout petit livre à lire pour un dépaysement assuré d'une réalité effarante.

DURING THE COVID LOCKDOWN, L'Abri staff initiated a French book club on the Zoom Internet platform, in hopes of easing pandemic isolation. Three or four residents who were comfortable in French took part. Vishaka Ratnayake, a coordinator at that time, would choose a story, write about ten questions about its content and forward them to the participants, who then discussed everything at a monthly meeting.

Vishaka was eventually replaced by **Leah Daghman**, who recruited me to help. We shared story-finding and hosting duties. Mostly we discussed myths and legends. This continued until June of this year, when Bessborough residents **Jerome** and **Jean-Sébastien** suggested we shake things up.

Jerome wanted to do a play reading and discussion, while Jean-Sébastien offered to write an original story. Jerome chose *Tartuffe*, a classic French comedy, for our July meeting. Participants were sent a resumé and the text of one scene. At our meeting each of us read one character's lines. Before long we saw that it was impossible to appreciate a great play by reading just one scene, and we decided not to repeat our foray into play reading.

In August, we discussed Jean-Seb's story, *Les aventures du Capitaine Rex et l'équipage spatiale*. Here's how it starts:

L'histoire se déroule à l'année 3034 sur la planète Woolf. C'est une planète du système solaire Animalis et il y existe juste des chiens qui ont la capacité de parler.
